The Annual Report gives insight into the progress made throughout 2015 by St Mary's Primary and the continued focus our school has on the improvement of Literacy and Numeracy achievement for all learners.

St Mary's is a Catholic Primary School catering for the educational needs of children from Prep to Year 6. We have a history of serving the Catholic community of Ipswich and its surrounds for 152 years. Our heritage listed buildings, which have been internally refurbished to cater to current educational practices, provide a tangible bridge connecting the past to the future.

We are blessed to have a dedicated staff, passionate about educating children through the provision of high quality teaching and learning experiences. Our close relationship with the priests and parishioners of St Mary's Parish helps our students develop a relationship with God. This relationship centres on our way of life that makes Jesus real in the lives of the members of St Mary's Primary community.

### Characteristics of the student body

The St Mary's student body is drawn from the city of Ipswich and its surrounds. We are a diverse community in terms of socioeconomic status and educational background. Together with the Brisbane Catholic Education Office, St Mary's has a dedicated approach to supporting students with learning needs.

During 2015 our Literacy and Numeracy Teacher worked within classrooms supporting student learning outcomes. A key component of this initiative was the building of teacher capacity through coaching and modelling.

The majority of the students are of the Catholic faith, with students from other Christian denominations and other faith traditions contributing to the religious culture of the school. The following subsets of students contribute to the unique characteristics of the school:-

### Our distinctive curriculum offerings

#### How Information and Communication Technologies are used to assist learning

The school endeavours to embed the use of Information and Communication Technologies in every aspect of the teaching learning cycle. Students from Prep to Year 7 regularly access one of the two computer laboratories as part of their learning. Within the classroom, students either individually or in small groups, access either i pads or laptops to support their learning in English and Mathematics.

Inactive whiteboards are utilized to engage students and enhance the teaching learning process. The school is networked via fibre optic cabling which supports efficient and effective data retrieval. The school's wireless footprint allows network access by students and teachers throughout all buildings and grounds allowing enhanced connectivity.

# Social climate inclusive of pastoral care and our response to bullying

St Mary's Primary ensures that a positive school culture is developed at every available formal and informal opportunity through the teaching and modelling of core Gospel Values. We achieve this in a variety of ways:-

- Making Jesus Real philosophy is at the core of all we do.
- Ensuring that Positive Behaviour is not only a policy but is taught, rewarded and re-enforced.
- Guidance Counsellor services
- Social Emotional Learning
- Class "Buddy" System
- Providing opportunities for students to learn about and participate in social justice activities.

#### Parent, student and teacher satisfaction with the school

Parents and students have opportunities at various times to participate in School Surveys. These responses provide feedback on current school performance as well as identifying suggestions for future direction. Parental responses indicate they have a very positive perception of St Mary's Primary.

#### Parent involvement in their child's education

Parental involvement is an essential aspect of school life at St Mary's. The Pastoral School Board supports the strategic direction of the school. Parish, parent and staff representatives bring varied perspectives to the decision making process. Our Parent and Friends Association plays a vital role in nurturing our sense of community, in support the maintenance and improvement of the learning environment for students and in addressing and responding to broader educational issues.

Each year in February, Parent Information Evenings provide the opportunity for parents and teachers to develop a shared understanding and commitment to the children in their care. At these meetings, teachers provide parents with an overview of the learning activities with which students will engage over the year ahead.

Formal Parent/Teacher interviews are conducted twice per year and many parents take these opportunities to discuss their child/rens' progress. Classroom teachers willingly meet with parents at other times. Many parents join their children on excursions, during classroom activities and sporting events.

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
# Policy and practice to manage student attendance
